### **WELCOME**

Welcome to the Annual Report for WCG's activities in 2022, a year where we finally moved on from the major disruption caused by the Covid pandemic, but continued to face major upheavals nationally and internationally. A combination of political turmoil in the UK, the war in Ukraine and the resultant spiralling of costs meant that life was still far from normal. Within this unsettled context, however, WCG staff and students have continued to make significant progress and a real contribution to the local and regional economies in which we operate.

The year started with our receipt of the Queen's Anniversary Prize at St James Palace from HRH Prince Charles and Princess Anne. in recognition of significant work in the development of engineering apprenticeships. We were pleased to subsequently be invited to The Queen's Anniversary Trust Student Trial, focused on sustainability. We were delighted that our project was the only winning college project and assisted our online sustainability learning programme now in place for all students.

We celebrated the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in the spring with tree planting in all our colleges. We then marked the passing of a great monarch in the autumn, with books of condolence at each campus to mark this poignant occasion.

2022 was a year which also saw a significant number of other positive developments and achievements across our college group.

Following degree awarding powers being granted in 2021 we were permitted to use the title Warwickshire College & University

Centre (WCUC) and from 2022 have begun to use this designation for all our higher education provision.

T Level provision for 16-18 year-olds was expanded with delivery across Digital Services, Engineering and the Built Environment, all of which are being supported by additional government investment to create new learning environments which befit this flagship provision. Further developments are already underway to introduce new pathways in Health, Childcare and Education, Business, Craft and Design and Media Broadcast and Production in 2023.

For businesses and adult learners across the region, WCG led a skills accelerator programme funded by the government's Strategic Development Fund, bringing together the four colleges in Coventry and Warwickshire. The Coventry and Warwickshire Adult Learning programme saw the funding utilised to create a new electric vehicle technology facility at Warwick Trident College, a railtrack training facility and additional construction facilities at Moreton Morrell College. The funding has enabled us to already deliver training in these regionally important skills areas to groups of adult learners.

Whilst the SDF funding enabled facility developments at two colleges, further changes were being made at Evesham College, with the creation of a new central hub building for students and staff, as well as a new entryway into the college.

WCG's achievements were not just restricted to physical development of our estate. The Careers Team were successful in achieving the coveted Quality in Careers award, recognising the outstanding work

carried out across the group by way of independent careers guidance and the group leadership's commitment to this approach.

We expanded our successful Prince's Trust Team delivery, taking on the running of Team programmes in Lincolnshire, integrating them into what is already the largest provision of Prince's Trust Team programmes in the UK. This expansion confirms the confidence which the Prince's Trust has in WCG's provision of these vital programmes.

Finally, the past year has been one with increased focus on our staff's wellbeing. Wellbeing@WCG was launched for the benefit of all our staff and delivered support and education across a number of wellbeing themes during the year, from menopause awareness to pregnancy loss support to managing money.

WCG's place and influence in the region continued to be cemented through the year, with the college being called on as the voice of further education regionally, in events such as the Coventry & Warwickshire Chamber of Commerce Economic Conference and the innovative new Future Forward conference staged at the Warwick School. In 2023 we will continue to ensure that our group works to meet the skills needs of our region to support its prosperity.

### THE YEAR AHEAD

The economic landscape changed dramatically in 2022, so that whilst the UK emerged from the shadow of Covid, this did not signal a return to 'normal'. Rather, we saw a new set of challenges impact on everyone's lives and across the FE sector, driven by the war in Ukraine, rising energy costs and not least, political uncertainty and upheaval in the UK.

As we enter 2023, some of these factors will continue to have an impact on WCG, including the challenge posed by rising costs set against very modest increases in funding for our learners.

A significant change that will gather pace in 2023 is the Level 3 reforms, which see more T Levels being introduced and a gradual move away from funding for traditional Level 3 BTEC programmes. WCG is well placed to manage this transition, having introduced a number of T Levels in 2022 and with a significant number due to start in 2023 and more in 2024.

The Skills and Post-16 Education Bill will also continue to shape our further education environment, with Local Skills Improvement Plans (LSIPs) beginning to take shape for both of the regions we operate in. The Chambers of Commerce in Coventry & Warwickshire and in Worcestershire are both leading the development of these LSIPs and WCG are delighted to be centrally involved, with positions on the board of both LSIPs.

We also anticipate seeing a change in our relationship with feeder schools across the region this year as new Provider Access Legislation (PAL) came into effect on 1 January. This puts more responsibility onto schools to provide opportunities for all pupils in Key stages 3, 4 and 5 to have meaningful interactions with providers like ourselves.



Our work in the last 18 months on the Strategic Development Fund projects in Coventry & Warwickshire should begin to bear fruit this coming year, as WCG will have a range of new adult learning facilities fully in use and with the capacity to deliver new programmes of reskilling to meet the needs of important sectors such as vehicle electrification, railway engineering and construction. These new offers, coupled with the Lifelong Learning Entitlement for adults will see adult learning patterns evolve in the coming years, for which WCG is well prepared.

As all these developments take place in 2023, WCG will focus on maximising the value that we deliver through any additional funding and opportunities that are provided. We will also continue to leverage the benefit of our University Centre branding and Bachelor degree awarding powers, as well as our Queen's Anniversary Prize.

I would like to give my thanks to all the governors, staff and students who have contributed to the success of WCG through their diligent work and dedication throughout the past year and who continue to deliver in 2023.

I am sure that 2023 will create some unexpected challenges and changes, as recent years have, but our experience is that WCG is well equipped to respond positively and dynamically.

### WCG launches new staff wellbeing initiative

WCG launched in January a new staff wellbeing initiative for its 1300 employees which offers tailored support to create a healthier environment for its employees. The initiative aims to bring wellbeing to life for staff members, and will focus on different topics throughout the year that are tailored to their needs. Employees will be invited to take part in awareness training, join online community forums and will be provided with guides featuring information and top tips to build awareness. They will also be signposted to a variety of external support services as well as WCG's Employee Assistance Programme (EAP) provider should anyone require additional help. The first topic being covered is menopause support, followed by domestic abuse, pregnancy loss and bereavement support.

### Fundraising success for community garden project at Birmingham church

Young people from Birmingham have raised £3.300 to fund works to create a new community garden at a church in Selly Oak. The funds to create the new space at St Mary's Church were raised by students enrolled in The Prince's Trust Team programme, which is delivered in the area by college group WCG in partnership with West Midlands Police. Students enrolled on the programme then used the funds to purchase materials and carried out the works themselves to create two large planting beds for the community at the church to use.



WCG now provides an inclusive online experience to enable website visitors to access online content and services barrier-free. As part of our diversity and inclusion strategy, website visitors are now able to access a wide range of accessibility and language support tools to customise their digital experience through Recite Me assistive technology. Being able to offer an inclusive experience is essential to support over 20% of the population who may encounter barriers when exploring our website due to having a disability, learning difficulty, visual impairment or if they speak English as a second language. The Recite Me assistive toolbar on our website includes screen reading

functionality, multiple reading aids, customisable styling options, and an on-demand live translation feature that boasts over 100 languages including 35 text-to-speech and styling options.



### Worcestershire colleges partner to ensure delivery supports regional economy

Three major Worcestershire colleges have joined forces to ensure education and training provision is developing skilled workers to support the needs of the regional economy. College group WCG, Kidderminster College and Heart of Worcestershire College have secured funding through the Government's Skills Accelerator Progression Fund to launch the collaboration, titled the Connectors project. It will focus on how colleges can implement the Local Skills Improvement Plans (LSIP) in Worcestershire.



### MP praises major Evesham College redevelopment plans

Nigel Huddleston, MP for Mid Worcestershire, praised major redevelopments at Evesham College after attending a consultation event showcasing the plans. He visited the week-long consultation alongside residents, councillors and employers to find out more about the Evesham New College plans. The college held four events over the course of a week to help people to better understand its plans to create a college focused on developing technical skills and meeting local and regional economic needs. The event displayed boards that detailed the plans for the college site, which include retaining the three key buildings that house all the workshops,

studios and salons required for technical programmes, as well as relocating the main college entrance.



### Tutor 'braves the shave' for Macmillan Cancer Support

A tutor from Evesham College has 'braved the shave' and raised more than £400 for Macmillan Cancer Support. Maison McDonnell, from Solihull, raised vital funds by shaving off his hair for charity. His Level 1 and Level 2 plumbing students came up with the idea to raise funds for Macmillan Cancer Support, which the students had already supported through a shoebox appeal at Christmas.





### The Prince's Trust Team Programme relaunches in Lincolnshire

A major programme which provides opportunities for young people to develop new skills and strengthen their career prospects has relaunched in Lincolnshire. The Prince's Trust Team Programme Lincolnshire, which operates across Grantham and Lincoln, offers participants a free 12-week employability course which aims to help young people develop employability skills and enhance their CVs. The programme has not been operational in the area since before the pandemic, but is now relaunching with new team leaders and a host of new activities, delivered by WCG, the largest provider of programmes for the Trust in England.

### WCG joins EIDA as part of wellbeing initiative

WCG has become a member of the Employers' Initiative on Domestic Abuse (EIDA), a network which raises awareness and provides resources for employers to play their part in tackling domestic abuse as part of its commitment to creating a healthier environment for employees. It came as WCG announced the launch of a new domestic abuse awareness and support initiative for staff as part of its Wellbeing @ WCG programme, which is offering tailored support to its 1,400 employees on a number of different topics throughout the year. The initiative will see WCG launch @WCG a video to educate staff about spotting the signs of domestic abuse and how they can respond and offer support.

### WCG celebrates Queen's Platinum Jubilee

Students and staff at WCG have been planting trees to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, as part of the Queen's Green Canopy initiative. All six colleges in WCG came together to plant a rowan tree at each of the sites. The young rowan trees, which are a favourite for wildlife, were supplied by Pershore College Garden Centre and Nursery. The initiative's focus on sustainability mirrors the college group's own green ethos, and the tree planting comes as the college group is awarded the Planet Mark sustainability certificate for an eighth consecutive year, which recognises organisations that make year-on-

### Warwick Trident College holds special celebration to mark arrival of Queen's **Anniversary Prize**

Staff, students and apprentices at Warwick Trident College held a celebration event as a prestigious prize which recognises its innovative engineering training arrived at the college.

WCG was presented with The Queen's Anniversary Prize for Higher and Further Education in February and for the first-time staff and students at the college were given a chance to see the award. The prize was awarded to the college group for its pioneering work in the engineering sector, and Warwick Trident College is one of WCG's three centres of engineering excellence alongside Evesham College and Rugby College.

### Revolutionary health scheme for jobseekers launches in Leamington Spa

Pet-Xi has teamed up with Royal Learnington Spa College's gym to help unemployed people improve their physical and mental wellbeing. PET-Xi has launched its 'Ignite' pilot health programme to help those in and around Leamington, Warwick and Kenilworth referred to the company as part of the government's Restart Scheme. The scheme takes a holistic approach to helping its participants not only find work but also improve their long-term health and wellbeing and

increase their likelihood of staying in work in the future. Ignite will see those referred to the Restart Scheme enrolled at Roval Leamington Spa College's gym, where they will receive a full induction, a tailored plan based on their fitness level. and additional advice and support from a dedicated health coach across a threemonth period.



### The Princess Royal visits Pershore College students at RHS Malvern Spring Festival

Princess Anne stopped by to speak with staff and students from a local college as they showcased their Commonwealth and environmental themed garden at a major show. She visited the garden created by supported learning students from Pershore College during the RHS Malvern Spring Festival and spent time at the garden to find out about its inspiration, environmental credentials and the work the students had put in to create it. A group of 90 students created the garden, which was entered into the School Garden Challenge at the event, and came away as highly commended. The four-metre squared plot included themed bunting made by the students and a model of the Queen's royal train, which travelled around the edge of the raised beds. Catering students created a special cream tea for the unveiling of the garden including home baked scones and jam made using fruits grown at the college.



New simulation rail track training facility opens at Moreton Morrell College

A new training facility has been laid at Moreton Morrell College to help develop the next generation of skilled individuals to keep the country's trains on track. WCG has partnered with RMF Group to create a new simulation rail track facility, which gives learners the chance to perfect their track maintenance skills while working effectively as a team and preparing for a promising career in the rail industry. The new teaching facility has cost more than £78.000 and has been funded by the DfE through the Skills Accelerator Development Fund.

### CEO and Principal take part in inaugural **FUTURE FWD Creative Conference**

A new concept in education conferences. Future Fwd. was established in July by Warwick Foundation Schools, focused on Next Generations and how educationalists and business leaders can enable them to be the changemakers' of tomorrow. The traditional conference format was reimagined as a practical, future-focused, creative conference, with young people at its core. Angela Joyce, Chief Executive of WCG and Peter Husband, Group Principal and COO were privileged to be speakers and round table discussion leaders at the event. Warwickshire has a rich heritage of academic excellence and of industry innovation, so WCG were pleased to be working with other forward-thinking organisations to focus on how we work collaboratively to best support our future generations.



Luxury housebuilder Mulberry Homes has made a donation of 4.000 bricks to Rugby College, near its upcoming Mulberry Homes at Houlton development and head office. The 4.000 bricks will be used by students so that they can practice their bricklaying skills. The donation is the first step in what will be an ongoing relationship between Rugby College and Mulberry Homes, as later in the year the housebuilder will be partnering with the college to offer apprenticeships and industry experience to students.

### WCG wins Royal Anniversary Trust Student Trial Prize Fund

A combined staff and student effort at WCG has received national recognition as part of the legacy of Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. WCG was named the latest winner of the Royal Anniversary Trust Student Trial Prize Fund through the Platinum Jubilee Challenge. The college group has been given £5,000 by the Royal Anniversary Trust to bring its concept of online learning modules - which focus on making sustainability and climate change a more accessible subject to life. WCG were one of only five winners that were announced at the Platinum Jubilee Challenge residential, and the only college to be recognised by the 42-strong judging panel.



### WCG awarded Quality in Careers Standard

WCG has been recognised for its outstanding careers work and been presented with a major standard. The college group has been awarded the national Quality in Careers Standard awarded under licence by Ixion. The Standard is awarded to education providers who can demonstrate the importance they place on careers and how they support students to make decisions about their life after school or college. Achieving the national Quality in Careers Standard shows how the principal, governors and leadership team at WCG embrace, promote and endorse quality careers education and recognise the part it plays in the overall success of the college and its students.

### **WCG** appoints new President

Louise has recently been appointed as Chair for the British Chambers of Commerce Local Skills Improvement Plans Group, in response to the Skills Act 2022.

### Vital flood prevention project completed at Moreton Morrell College

A vital project to help minimise the impact of flooding on people living in Wellesbourne has been completed by Wellesbourne and Walton Flood Action Group (WWFAG), working with Moreton Morrell College to help slow the flow of Newbold Brook, which runs through the north of Wellesbourne. The project is the first stage in a string of planned Natural Flood Management intervention works which will positively impact both Newbold Brook and the River Dene by 'slowing the flow'.



### EV training facility opens at Warwick Trident College

A new £477,000 electric vehicle training facility has been completed to help train the next generation of motor vehicle specialists at Warwick Trident College, College group WCG has partnered with consultants and industry experts Miretur Ltd to create the facility which will support students on automotive courses at the college.

The facility will also be used in training programmes developed by Miretur, and features fully-converted workshops with specialist features for the training of skills associated with electric vehicles. The workshop is home to three electric vehicles, one hybrid, one plugin hybrid and one fully electric - with specialist tools and diagnostics equipment also available.

### Duo of degree-level courses receive AHPR accreditation

Moreton Morrell College has been awarded accreditation for two of its degree-level courses from a major industry body – further increasing the stellar reputation of its veterinary physiotherapy and animal therapy graduates.

The college, which is part of college group WCG, has seen its BSc Veterinary Physiotherapy and BSc Canine Therapy and Rehabilitation courses accredited by the Animal Health Professions Register (AHPR).

The accreditation positions the college and its students perfectly to capitalise on the continued professionalisation of both disciplines – with calls from industry to make both titles protected by law.

The degrees are delivered by Warwickshire College and University Centre (WCUC). The university centre launched last year after WCG became the first college group to hold both Bachelor and Foundation degree awarding powers and can now curate and award its own degree-level qualifications.



### Rugby student stars on Hippodrome stage

A Rugby performing arts student starred at the Birmingham Hippodrome as part of a Shakespearean 'monologue slam' organised by a prominent national theatre company. Kelise Foster is currently studying a degree in Performing Arts at Rugby College and came through an open audition process to star in MonologueSlam UK. The show was set-up to showcase talent in the industry and is supported by the Mawa Theatre Company. The company is the UK's first all-Black, all female Shakespeare Company representing women of the African diaspora.



### Student's artwork displayed on billboards in the Netherlands

A student from Royal Leamington Spa College has seen her artwork displayed on billboards across the Netherlands as part of an international festival. Katie Jones, who is studying on the Level 6 BA Graphic Design with Photography course, had work selected to be shown as part of the International Motion festival - DEMO (Design in Motion) Festival. Held for the second time since 2019, the festival is a 24hour event showcasing the world's best motion design on 5000 screens and billboards across the Netherlands.



### WCUC launch leads to surge in degree course applications

Applications for degree courses at Warwickshire College and University Centre (WCUC) have seen a significant boost since the launch of the new university centre in late 2021. Applications for the year were up by over 10% across the board. It is the first recruitment cycle for WCUC and also comes after the college became the first college group in the UK to be granted Bachelor degree awarding powers by the Office for Students, alongside the Foundation degree awarding powers already in place.



### Moreton Morrell students research impact treatments can have on horse stress

Moreton Morrell College students have discovered the impact treatments can have on stress in horses after tapping into the expertise of a state-of-the-art research centre. Maya Grist and Kaya Wales are both studying degrees at the college and have been conducting research into cortisol in horses using saliva swab tests conducted at the Agri-Tech Research Centre at Pershore College – both part of college group WCUC. Maya, from Swindon, is studying a three-year degree in Equine Therapy and Rehabilitation and Kaya, from Stratford upon is in the final year of her Equine Science degree. The pair both conducted separate research projects, with Maya researching the impact of cryotherapy on horse stress levels and Kaya focusing on the effect that the use of essential oils can have on the animal.



### Degree students take to stage at Rugby College in 'Be My Baby'

Degree-level students at Rugby College returned to the stage for the first time since the pandemic when they performed a popular British play. The students on the new BA (Hons) Performing Arts course brought Amanda Whittington's 'Be My Baby' to The Platform Theatre in Rugby College. It marked the first time the degree students got to perform in front of a full audience at the college - with other performances curtailed by the impact of Covid-19. Around 20 students supported the production across the three days, with members of the public invited to come along and see the next generation of stage talent. Be My Baby follows the story of 19-year-old Mary, who is seven months pregnant when her mother delivers her into the charge of a church-run maternity for young, unmarried women.

### Graphic design and photography students wow national charity

A trio of graphic design and photography students wowed a national charity and could be set to have their designs published on major transport networks. Katie Jones. Riannon Grimsley and Olivia Krawczyk created six posters to educate, inform and sparked conversation around sex and people with disabilities. The students from Royal Leamington Spa College are all studying HND Graphic Design and Photography. Tutors at the college organised for Katie, Riannon and Olivia to present their designs to charity Enhance The UK - which aims to change the way people view disability. Its global campaign 'Undressing Disability' aims to raise standard in sexual health and sexual awareness for people with disabilities.



### Graduates from Warwickshire and Worcestershire celebrate in trio of ceremonies

More than 160 graduates from Warwickshire College and University Centre (WCUC) attended the ceremonies at St Mary's Church in Warwick.

The three ceremonies saw students from Royal Learnington Spa College, Rugby College, Moreton Morrell College and Pershore College graduating. The ceremonies, held over two days, were followed by a procession through the heart of Warwick in the historic parish church.

The graduates came from a wide range of courses, including business, counselling and psychotherapy, early years, business management, performing arts, game design, engineering, floristry, equine therapy and rehabilitation, veterinary physiotherapy, veterinary nursing and many more.



### **IET Accreditation for Engineering** Top-up degree

### Trio of Fellowships awarded by WCUC

Three new Fellowship awards were awarded at the WCUC graduations ceremonies in October 2022.

David Darling, Founder & CEO of mobile game development studio and publisher Kwalee and co-founder of Codemasters, has been named a Fellow of Warwickshire College and University Centre at the ceremony which included graduates from the university centre's Games Art degree programmes. David is recognised as one of the founding fathers of 'Silicon Spa', having founded Codemasters with his brother Richard in the region in 1986.

At the land-based degrees ceremony, Judy Edwards was awarded her Fellowship of WCUC. The award was in recognition of her significant contribution to the equestrian provision at Moreton Morrell College and the leading role she played in the development of the wider equestrian industry. Judy is a leading figure in the equestrian industry and former chief executive of The Pony Club for 10 years.

The third Fellowship was awarded to Peter Manford, who spent 14 years on the board of governors of WCG and was Chair of the board for the final five of those years. Peter, a solicitor by profession, extended his term as Chair in order to help the college navigate the challenges brought by the coronavirus pandemic.

### 'Let's Talk Games' success in Royal Leamington Spa

The next generation of video game designers in Leamington heard about the incredible possibilities right on their doorstep from some of the biggest names in the sector at a one-day conference. Students at WCUC heard from giants of Leamington's game industry past and present at its 'Let's Talk Games' event around the history of the industry in the town, emerging technology in the business, and what working in the sector involves. The dozens in attendance also heard from an all-female panel of WCUC alumni who have gone on to have successful careers working for games companies in Leamington.

The audience also heard from a variety of key figures working in the games industry in Leamington, including Leamington games industry gaming pioneers Philip and Andrew Oliver, Jason Garlick of EA, David Paris of Playground Games, Lucia Pigoli of Sumo Leamington, Joe Taylor of Rebellion North and a selection of character artists from Ubisoft Leamington.





### Professor lands key role on major new journal

WCG has continued to grow its internationally recognised research profile after Professor Richard J. Pearce, associate professor for Animal Ecology and Biodiversity Research was appointed to the editorial review board for Frontiers in Arachnid Science academic journal. Frontiers in Arachnid Science was officially launched on November 2nd and is the latest open access journal from the renowned scientific journal publisher. Professor Pearce, who is based at Moreton Morrell College, is a nationally-renowned arachnologist, and runs his research programme from a laboratory at the college in Warwickshire. He has served on the Council of the British Arachnological Society and his involvement with international societies sees his expertise impact on a range of projects across the globe.

### Refugees gain tools for success with English Language courses

Royal Learnington Spa College began offering English language lessons for refugee students in summer 2022, and has now welcomed learners from Ukraine, Afghanistan, Iraq and Syria. The college's English as a Foreign Language (EFL) department, which last year taught 16 different nationalities, offered courses for students of different abilities to improve their English speaking, listening, reading and writing within a supportive, educational setting.



### Rugby College providing safe exercise space for asylum seekers

Rugby College has partnered with Community Welcome to provide free access to its gym and fitness facilities for people seeking sanctuary from across the globe. Refugees from Ukraine, Afghanistan, Syria, Iraq, Saudi Arabia and Iran are among the people to have already benefited from the new arrangement. Community Welcome has now welcomed a new group of young men and they have started to use the gym, with the previous group having moved onto the next stage of the asylum process. The gym sessions are part of a wider sports project for asylum seekers in Rugby which has been running for around three months, supported by a grant from Warwickshire County Council - which includes a weekly warm up session with a PT followed by football skills and a match with a professional coach.

### Delegation with the British Council visits Trident College

Decision makers from across the globe visited the college to discover more about how the college works in partnership with employers to develop technical and vocational education programmes. More than 50 delegates from around the world paid a visit as part of a conference organised by The British Council.

The conference titled 'Technical and vocational education and training (TVET) for a sustainable economy' provided visitors with the opportunity to reflect on the work the UK has done to develop an effective TVET system and consider how potential takeaways could be applied in their own countries. The college visit provided opportunities for delegates to hear directly from an established Further Education College, which has a track record of working successfully with employers, exemplified by it receiving The Queen's Anniversary Prize for Higher and Further Education in 2021.




Businesses were urged to consider apprenticeships to help bridge the recruitment crisis in hospitality – and a new apprenticeships fair was launched to help them do so. The Hospitality Apprenticeships Fair took place at Metropolis restaurant in Coventry as part of National Apprenticeship Week. It was a collaboration between WCG, Stratford-upon-Avon College, Coventry College, Coventry City Council, Warwickshire Skills Hub and Pet-Xi and attracted local employers from across the region's hospitality sector, with the likes of Caviar & Chips and Bespoke Hotels attending. Prospective apprentices were able to meet face-to-face with employers and training providers to explore opportunities for apprenticeships within the hospitality industry.

### Bucking the national trend

In the third quarter of 2022, as the new academic year started, the number of new apprentices starting with WCG Apprenticeships showed growth at a time when the national picture was the exact opposite.

WCG apprentice starts grew by 3% in the critical August to October period, as September is the month when the greatest number of apprentices start each year. By contrast, the number of apprenticeship starts nationally declined by 16% in August to October 2022 compared to the same period a year earlier.

A Worcestershire farrier has received national recognition after securing two awards from the profession's leading trade organisation. Pip Rowland, from Evesham, has been recognised by the Worshipful Company of Farriers (WCF) in a graduation ceremony at the Honourable Artillery Company in London. The college invests the proceeds from all bookings at its centrally-located venues back into the education of its students.



### WCG Venues partners with Anthony's Catering

A Nuneaton catering company has partnered with WCG to support its re-launched conferencing and events venues. WCG has appointed Anthony's Bistro as the catering partner for its 'Venues' brand which operates its conferences and events across its colleges. WCG has committed to using local suppliers to deliver 'Venues' and that all partners will be within 30 miles of its colleges. Anthony's Bistro was set up in 2011 and started life as a coffee shop. After more than 10 years, the owners decided to close the coffee shop and redirect the business to specialise in external catering – with a focus on weddings and conferences. It is staffed by local people and uses local suppliers for all of its produce where possible. including meat from popular Nuneaton butcher Frank Parker and vegetables from Leicester Market. The business has also recently started working with Gayton's Bakery in Atherstone.



### National creative arts festival returns to Rugby College

Puppets, illusions, creative arts and storytelling were the focus of a two-day festival that returned to Warwickshire for the first time in three years. Rugby College welcomed the newly-named Equip Festival to its Rugby base in October. ### Link Nurseries to be more wheelchair accessible after generous donation in will



The display was the result of months of growing and ensuring plants were up to the high judging standards of the Royal Horticultural Society.





### **WCG ALUMNI**

A television star and best-selling author made a triumphant return to his former college in Warwickshire which had played a key role in his career.

Kaleb Cooper shot to fame in 2021 as Jeremy Clarkson's right-hand man in the hit Prime Video series Clarkson's Farm. The show documented the former Top Gear star's attempts to run a 1,000-acre farm in the Cotswolds.

The success of the programme saw a second and third series be given the greenlight, propelling 24-year-old Kaleb from being a young farmer with humble beginnings into becoming an unlikely TV celebrity.

Many of the skills that millions of viewers have seen in action on their television screens and Clarkson has become dependent upon were honed at Moreton Morrell College.

Kaleb achieved Level 2 and Level 3 Agriculture Apprenticeship qualifications when he was a teenager back in 2016 and he recently returned to the college as a special quest speaker.

In a Q&A session at the college Kaleb commented on how coming to college had helped him: "I'd rather be down on the farm learning than just be sat in the classroom. So that was a really big help for me, coming out of school where I was in a classroom all the time, to being in a college that had a farm. That was amazing."

Kaleb, who was also promoting his book 'The World According to Kaleb', told the audience how he started life in farming by selling eggs laid by three chickens his mother gifted him for his thirteenth birthday.

While he can now boast an Instagram following nearly 200 times greater than the population of his home town of Chipping Norton in the Cotswold Hills, it was rubbing shoulders with like-minded fellow young farmers that formed the highlight of his time at Moreton Morrell College.

"Coming in, speaking to people who were the same age as me, who are young farmers, the same as me and speak farming, was what I enjoyed most," he said.

"There were people from Warwickshire, Gloucestershire and everyone else around the local area who are also farmers; it was a pleasure to meet them."

Kaleb's return to Moreton Morrell College was part of the college's long-standing commitment for attracting back its alumni to share experiences with the next generation of learners.

Jenny Bulayima, Alumni Officer for WCG, had invited Kaleb to visit Moreton Morrell College to meet students as part of the launch of the new WCG and WCUC Alumni Society.

She said "we believe that it's incredibly important to retain the connection to past students so that we can continue to engage with them, and showcase their successes as a means of motivating and encouraging today's learners.

"Kaleb Cooper is an excellent example of a WCG apprentice who has gone on to great things, and his passion for farming was a great stimulus to all our current agriculture students.

"As the Alumni Society develops we hope to see many more alumni coming back into all our colleges to share their wealth of experience and knowledge with the next generation."


